

Multiple Sclerosis Diagnosis - Diagnosis of Multiple Sclerosis

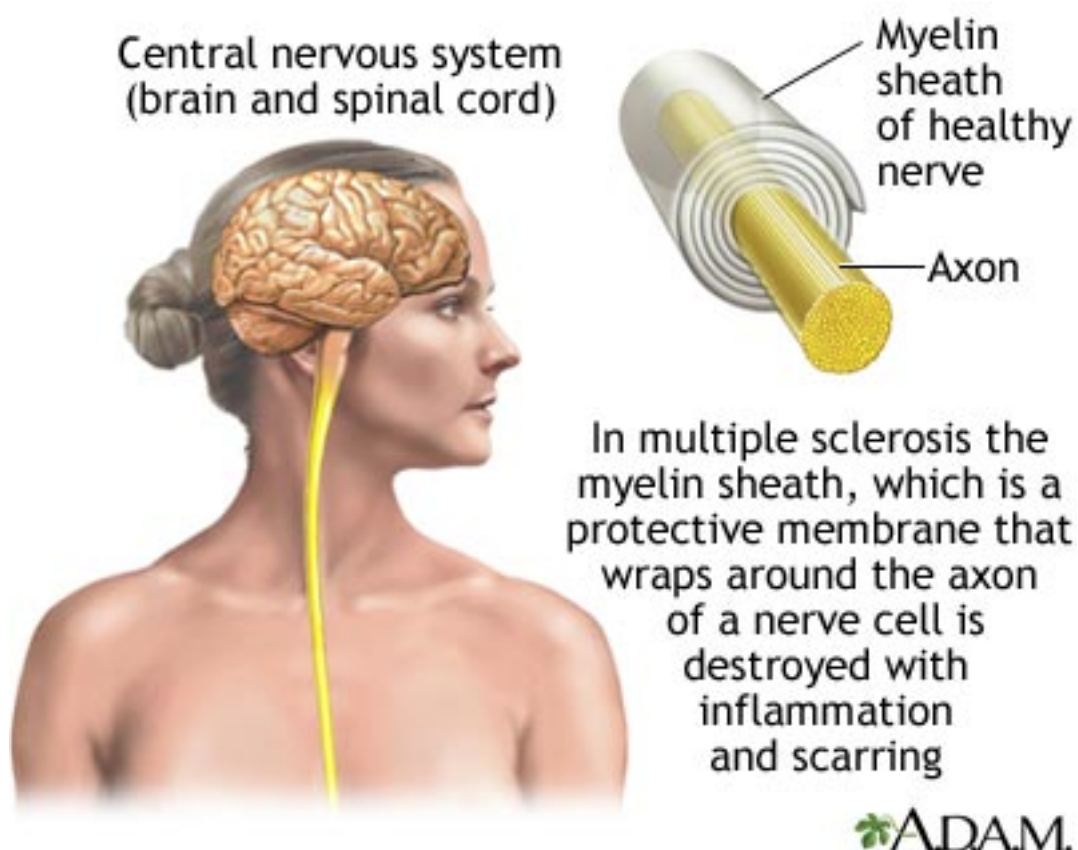

According to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the condition affects about 400,000 Americans and is the most frequent cause of neurological disability other than trauma in people from ages 20 to 50. Symptoms vary among patients and can range from mild to severe and may cause numbness of the limbs, paralysis and even loss of vision. The progression and severity of the disease are unpredictable. **Symptoms of Multiple**

sclerosis include but are not limited to the following:

- Fatigue
- Lack of coordination
- Double vision or pain in the eye
- Blurred or loss of vision in one eye
- Numbness in limbs
- Dizziness
- Tremors
- Tingling pain in different parts of body
- Electric-shock sensation with head movements
